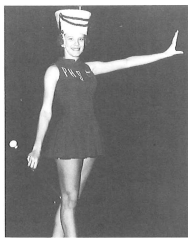

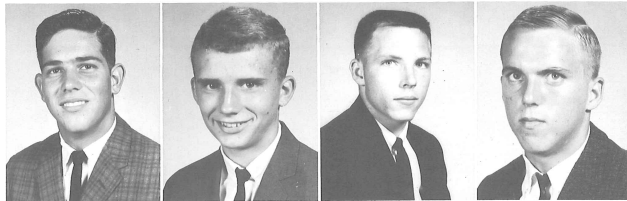


1963 Pirates . . Determined . .

Yes, that's the only way to describe the Pirates of 1963. With only six lettermen returning from a disappointing 3-5-2 season in 1962, even the most loyal of fans were not too optimistic. But the Pirates would believe no one but themselves, and came through the season with a splendid 6-4 record, and a fourth place finish in the Southwest Florida Conference.

The Pirates started the season under head-coach Wayne Malone, but he was forced to resign after the second game, due to also holding the position of principal. Coach John Woodall then took over and guided the Pirates through the rest of this fine season.

At the end of the season, the Pirates placed five members on the all-Southwest Florida Conference team. Quarterback Jimmy Sessoms and guard Paul Lombardo made the first team, while center Sam Sessa, guard Ronald Cleveland, and fullback Tom Culliton were named to second-team berths.

The Pirates opened the season traveling to meet the Gobblers of Turkey Creek. Quarterback Jimmy Sessoms scored once on a 35 yard run, and another on a 30 yard pass interception. Halfback Brant Blessing scored the final TD on a 15 yard run.

PASCO 13 - NEW PORT RICHEY GULF 0

The Pirates met the Buccaneers of Gulf in the first home game of the season. Jimmy Sessoms passed to end Lewis Surratt for the first touchdown. Tom Culliton scored the final TD on a 9 yard run.

PASCO 19 - BARTOW 7

The "Big Red" opened conference play traveling to Bartow, and upset the Yellow Jackets 19-7. Tom Culliton scored first on a 1 yard plunge. A 20 yard pass to Lewis Surratt set up this touchdown. Jimmy Sessoms then received a Bartow punt at the 20 yard line, and raced 80 yards to a TD. Worsley Morris scored the last TD on a sweep around end. John Culliton picked up a fumble and ran 70 yards to set up this touchdown.

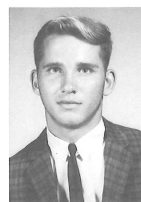

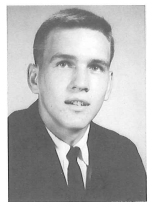

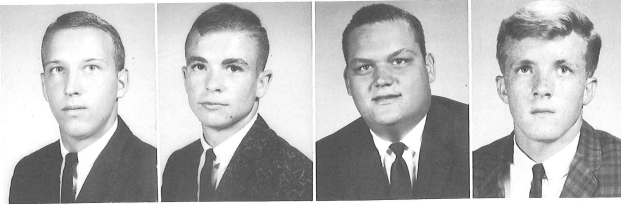

PASCO 18 - HAINES CITY 12

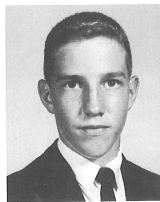

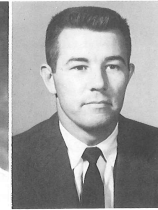

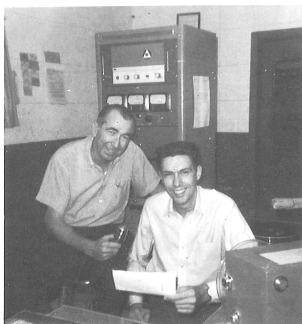

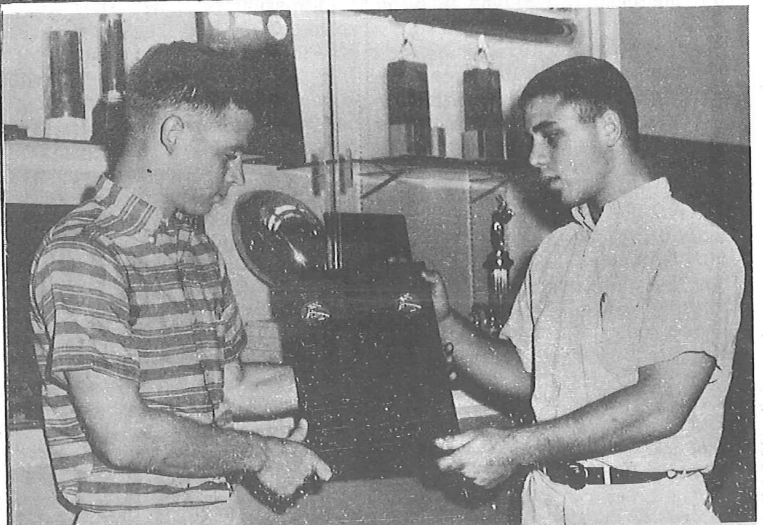

New Stadium Is Planned; May Be Ready by Next Fall

A plan to construct a \$250,000 sports complex, a plan to be developed and utilized so that it will become the sports center of East Pasco County was unveiled a few weeks ago by the Pirate Boosters Club.

The first unit of the sports facility, a football stadium estimated to cost between 75,000 and 100,000 dollars, and similar to the stadium at Auburndale or Dad's stadium in Tampa, should be completed in time for Big Red's football games next fall. It will be located on Highway 52 at the new Pasco High School.

The plans call for a football stadium and field which will have drainage, lighting facilities, a track, a baseball field, paved parking area, and security fencing.

This sports complex will be financed by a private committee the Dade City Stadium Committee, Inc.

Future plans call for tennis courts, a gymnasium, swimming pool, and other items to complete the facilities.

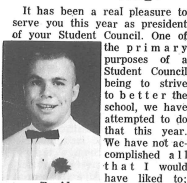

Japanese Students Seeking Pen Pals

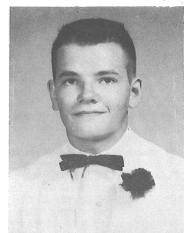

It would be very interesting to learn the same about them and their country. They would be very pleased to hear from you.

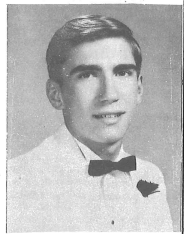

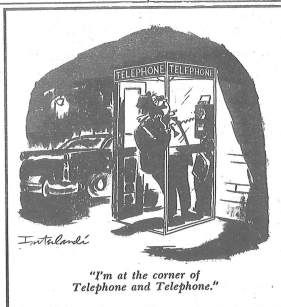
J. Englestone, introduced Dr. C. Allen Brink. Dr. Brink led the group in the singing of "America" and several Rotary Club songs.

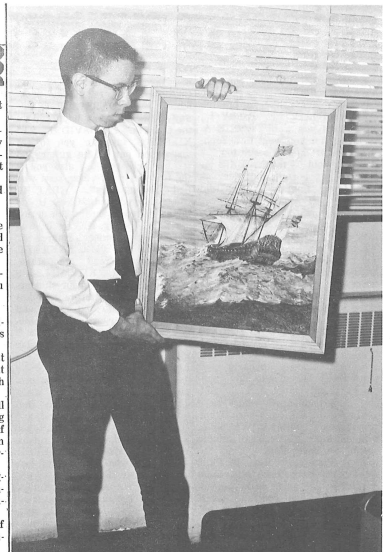
